PERENNIALS FOR THE SHADE GARDEN Beate Popkin

NATIVE PLANTS

Short (less than 1' tall) – can be used for ground covers

Allegheny spurge (*Pachysandra procumbens*) spreads slowly to form evergreen mound

Appalachian sedge (*Carex appalachica*) tolerates drier conditions
Bellwort or merrybells (*Uvularia grandiflora*) blooms early spring; needs moisture
Bishop's cap (*Mitella diphylla*) similar to foam flower; white spring blooms
Bleeding heart (*Dicentra eximia*) pink spring to early summer flowering
Celandine poppy (*Stylophorum diphyllum*) needs moisture; goes dormant in summer
Coral bells (*Heuchera americana*) shade/part sun; white flower stalks; grown for
foliage

Creeping phlox (Phlox stolonifera) spreads by stolons; flowers early summer Dittany (Cunila origanoides) tolerates dry conditions but likes some sun Dutchman's breeches (Dicentra cucullaria) unique white to cream flowers Dwarf iris (Iris cristata) early spring blooms; dies back in summer Foam flower (Tiarella cordifolia) pinkish flowers in May, tolerates deep shade Green 'n gold (*Chrysogonum virginianum*) yellow flowers thru summer; medium to wet Golden ragwort (*Packera aurea*) needs moisture, spreads fast when happy Jacob's ladder (*Polemonium reptans*) light blue flowers in spring, clumping, self-seeds Pennsylvania sedge (Carex pensylvanica) grass-like plant, medium moisture Purple phacelia (*Phacelia bipinnatifida*) bi-annual, tolerates dry conditions, self-seeds Round leaf ragwort (*Packera obovata*) similar to golden ragwort Squirrel corn (*Dicentra canadensis*) similar to Dutchman's breeches Stonecrop (Sedum ternatum) dry sites, pavement edges; only native sedum Wild geranium (Geranium maculatum) benefits from some sun; lilac flowers in spring Wild ginger (Asarum canadense) spreads, flowers are early and hidden Woodland phlox (Phlox divaricata) blue flowers in spring, medium moisture

True ephemerals with an early short flowering time that die back in summer

Bloodroot (*Sanguinea americana*) showy white flowers; leaves persist through summer Dwarf larkspur (*Delphinium tricorne*) spikes of blue, spurred flowers; moist, part sun Jack-in-the Pulpit (*Arisaema triphyllum*) unique arum flower; medium to wet, deep

shade

Mayapple (*Podophyllum peltatum*) one white flower under leaf; spreads by rhizomes Rue anemone (*Thalictrum thalictroides*) small white flower; best in groups Toothwort (*Cardamine concatenata*) small white flowers; leaves persist Trillium (*Trillium* sp.) many Eastern native species; yellow, white, red; medium moisture

Trout lily (*Erythronium americanum*) showy yellow flowers Twinleaf (*Jeffersonia diphylla*) leaves may persist through summer Virginia bluebells (*Mertensia virginica*) showy blue/pink flowers

Medium height (to 2 feet)

Bluestem goldenrod (Solidago caesia) tolerates part shade, tolerates clay
Blue wood aster (Symphiotrichum cordifolium) flowers late summer, full sun/part shade
Columbine (Aquilegia canadensis) long blooming red/yellow flowers, part shade
False Solomon's seal (Maianthemum racemosum) terminal cluster of white flowers
Indian pink (Spigelia marilandica) striking red/yellow flowers late summer
Short-toothed mountain mint (Pycnanthemum muticum) tolerates sun, aromatic
Solomon's seal (Polygonatum biflorum) twin white flowers in axils; spreads by
rhizomes

Spiderwort (*Tradescantia ohioensis*) sun/part shade, spreads easily; sprawling White snakeroot (*Eupatorium rugosum*) full sun to part shade, spreads easily

Tall (2+ feet)

American spikenard (*Aralia racemosa*) shrub like;
Black cohosh (*Actaea racemosa*) part to full shade; spikes of white flowers
Garden phlox (*Phlox paniculata*), blooms best in sun
Goat's beard (*Aruncus dioicus*) part shade; moist to wet, showy white flower cluster
Sunflower (*Helianthus divaricatus*) bright yellow flowers; more drought tolerant
Tall bellflower (*Campanella americana*) striking spike of blue flowers; prefers more sun

Native ferns excellent for shade gardens

Christmas fern (*Polystichum acrostichoides*)
Cinnamon fern (*Osmundastrum cinnamomea*)
Eastern wood fern (*Dryopteris marginalis*)
Hay-scented fern (*Dennstaedtia punctiloba*)
Ostrich fern (*Matteuccia struthiopteris*)
Royal Fern (*Osmunda regalis*)
Sensitive fern (*Osmunda claytonia*)

NON NATIVE PLANTS THAT ARE NOT INVASIVE

These plants are found in shade gardens; most are available at garden centers.

Bishop's hat/barrenwort (*Epimedium* hybrids) 'Sulphureum' is a yellow cultivar European bleeding heart (*Dicentra spectabilis*) more showy than our native False spirea (*Astilbe* sp.) similar to foam flower; showy spikes of long-blooming flowers Leopard plant (*Ligularia dentata*) can grow to 3 feet; prefers more moisture Lenten rose (*Helleborus orientalis*) white, pink, maroon blooms very early spring Lungwort (*Pulmonaria officinalis*) low growing; pink-blue flowers in spring Siberian bugloss (*Brunnera macrophylla*) low growing plant with showy blue flowers Winter begonia (*Bergenia ciliata*) low growing plant with pink spring flowers
